
How do the words we use—such as "Indian" and "Removal"—shape the way we understand historical events?

"'Indian' is for good reason a designation of pride for many native people in the United States today, but when used to describe the diverse individuals and communities who were expelled from their homelands in the nineteenth century, its fanciful and specious [misleading] associations distort our understanding of the past... The label conjures up so many stereotypes that it clouds the mind, making it impossible to see the past clearly...

'Removal' is equally unfitting for a story about the state-sponsored expulsion of eighty thousand people. It is a 'soft word,' said the Massachusetts representative Edward Everett... Then and now, it conveys no sense of coercion or violence. The phrase 'Indian Removal,' coined by proponents of the policy... was an unusual construction that left unstated who was removing whom. Where Indians doing it to themselves? The phrase is artfully vague."







What is one argument Turner is making about the frontier? What does that tell you about his perspective?

One argument Turner makes is that the frontier changed people by turning **European settlers into tough, independent** Americans. He believed the frontier was the place where "civilization" met "savagery," and where settlers had to adapt to survive. This shows that Turner thought westward expansion was a good thing and an important part of American history. However, his words also show that he saw Native Americans and their way of life as less important or less advanced, which reflects the unfair and biased views many people had at that time. 
What do you predict will be the effects and impact of these changes?



How do the words we use—such as "Indian" and "Removal"—shape the way we understand historical events?


The words we use can change how we see history. For example, the word "Indian" was used to describe many different Native American tribes, even though they had their own names, cultures, and languages. This makes it seem like they were all the same, which isn't true. The word "Removal" sounds like Native Americans just moved away, but really, they were forced off their land by the U.S. government. Many suffered and died, but the word "removal" makes it sound peaceful, when it was actually very violent. Changing the way we talk about history helps us understand what really happened instead of hiding the truth.

"'Indian' is for good reason a designation of pride for many native people in the United States today, but when used to describe the diverse individuals and communities who were expelled from their homelands in the nineteenth century, its fanciful and specious [misleading] associations distort our understanding of the past...
